

Recording and Report of the November MNORN Member Meeting: Nursing for Planetary Health: Calling Nurses to Co-Create the Great Transition



Teddie Potter was the presenter. Teddie r is deeply committed to climate change education including co-foundingHealth Professionals for a Healthy Climate, membership in the Alliance of Nurses for Healthy Environments, and membership on the American Academy of NursingEnvironment and Public Health Expert Panel. She is a member of the CoordinatingCommittee of Columbia University's Global Consortium on Climate and HealthEducation and a Fellow in the Institute on the Environment at the University ofMinnesota. She chairs Clinicians for Planetary Health (C4PH) and is a member of theSteering Committee of the Planetary Health Alliance at Harvard. In 2019, Teddie was appointed the first Director of Planetary Health for the School of Nursing at the University of Minnesota. In addition, Teddie is Executive Editor for the Interdisciplinary Journal of Partnership Studies; a peer-reviewed, open-access, on-line journal promoting interdisciplinary collaboration as a solution for solving society's grand challenges.

Learning Objectives

- Describe the interconnection of Earth's natural systems and the impact on human and ecosystem health
- Define the five core domains of planetary health
- List opportunities for nurses and health professionals to co-create the Great Transition for future generations.

Highlights of the presentation were:

- a. Many nursing organizations are creating policy statements and initiatives about climate change. Nursing leaders are recognizing this crisis and wanting to work towards solutions as a profession.
- b. The planet is changing due to human actions; these changes affect human health (among other things).
- c. "Planetary Health" was defined as a solutions-oriented movement focused on addressing the impacts of these planetary changes. The emphasis was on hope and positive work, not on negativity.
- d. The Planetary Health Education Framework, part of the Planetary Health Alliance, has five core domains. The purpose of this framework is to create a shared language among disciplines so interdisciplinary work and communication is more seamless.
- e. Change must happen and must happen quickly.
- f. There are many barriers for health care professionals in working in planetary health, including how to approach clients regarding this topic.
- g. This movement uses a systems approach, consisting of five domains, to move this work forward. The plan is defined, organized, strategic and thoughtful.

Focus on the presentation was positive and emphasized both the significant work that has already been done in this area and the feasibility of future work.

New center at the University of Minnesota launches to restore planetary health



The School of Nursing announced the launch of the Center for Planetary Health and Environmental Justice to educate future planetary health leaders, promote planetary health practice and advance innovative research.

The center will build local to global partnerships to advance both planetary health and environmental justice.



"Nurses need to take an active leadership role in planetary health and environmental justice so others realize they need to be paying attention to this environmental crisis," says Teddie Potter, PhD, RN, FAAN, FNAP, the center's inaugural director who also serves as the director for planetary health at the school. "By establishing the

center, we are proudly claiming our leadership in this space."

The school has long been a leader in planetary health, from creating interprofessional curriculum that explains the connection between climate and health to developing partnerships with local, national and global collaborators that are advancing the understanding of the interconnectedness of health and the environment.

Nurses need to take an active leadership role in planetary health and environmental justice so others realize they need to be paying attention to this environmental crisis.

The establishment of the center creates another avenue to engage faculty, students and staff in planetary health and environmental justice at the school.

"Our goal has always been to encourage all faculty, staff and students to see themselves in this work. It is a foundation of who we are. By creating a center it solidifies our values and commitment even further so that future permutations of the school see we've established this as a pillar of the school," says Potter. Potter is currently identifying external and internal advisers for the center who are recognized as environmental justice and planetary health leaders locally, in rural Minnesota and national partners, including partnerships with the Planetary Health Alliance, Health Care Without Harm and Alliance of Nurses for Health Environments.

Partnership, solidarity, and an orientation toward solutions and actions are some of the core values of the center.

"In the past, centers could be launched and their work became proprietary. That's not our intention. The center will demonstrate how we can thread planetary health and environmental justice through our research, education, policy work and practice as an example for other schools to do so similarly," says Potter.

"Registered nurses (RNs) are integral parts of the health care team and spend significant time with patients providing clinical services. In the current health care financing system, this work is generally not accounted for, other than in the physician's practice expense (PE) relative value unit (RVU). The lack of NPIs for nurses makes it extremely difficult to record, measure, and value the services they provide and their impact on patient outcomes.....Obtaining and recording NPIs in appropriate healthcare data systems would allow health systems, payers, and enterprise resource planning systems to extract nursing services from other providers. This then allows for a quantitative analysis and substantive demonstration of the nurse's role and value as an integral member of a patient's health care team."

¹A staff nurse is defined as one who is nonsupervisory, non-managerial, and includes one or more of the following: (a) is employed by a health care institution or agency; (b) whose primary role is a provider of direct patient care; (c) who is collective bargaining eligible under applicable labor law.
